Helping Children Grow Up Mentally Healthy

Good mental health allows children to think clearly, develop positive relationships, learn new skills, build self-esteem, and develop a positive outlook on life. Here are the basics for a child's good mental health:

- Give your child unconditional love.
- Notice your child's interests and talk about what they do well.
- Encourage your child to play; independent and group play are both important.
- Provide a safe and secure environment where it's OK for them to make mistakes.
- Demonstrate and explain "good" behavior to help your child develop good habits.
- Listen and talk to your child with the same respect you want from them.
- If you feel that stress is overwhelming your family life and impacting your relationships, it's OK to ask for help! The Helpbook will help you find the resources you need; if you can't figure out where to start, call the Children's Resource Center at 695-6565.

Eat Smart, Move More!

Childhood obesity is a growing problem in our nation, our state ... and right here in Catawba County. Here are some quick and easy ideas and resources to encourage you and your family to embrace healthy behaviors.

Make a decision to **Eat Smart** and **Move More** today!

Tame the Tube...



Plan how much TV you and your family are going to watch. Set clear limits and be a good role model for your children. Make a list of activities you want to do instead of watching TV. Don't keep the TV on all of the time at your home. When you do watch, talk about what you've seen with your kids.

Right-Size your Portions...

If you order take-out, don't super-size! Otherwise, remember that the secret to a "serving size" is in your hand. Here are some general rules: A fist or cupped hand = 1 cup of food (1 serving equals $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of cereal, rice or pasta, 1 cup of raw leafy green vegetables, or $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of raw vegetables or fruit) A thumb = 1 ounce (1 serving equals $1\frac{1}{2}$ -2 ounces of low-fat cheese) A handful = about 1-2 ounces (1 serving equals 1 ounce of nuts or 2 ounces of pretzels) Palm of your hand = about 3 ounces (1 serving equals 3 ounces of meat) Tip of your thumb = 1 teaspoon (Keep high fat foods such as peanut butter and mayonnaise at a minimum by measuring the serving with the tip of your thumb.



Choose to Move More Everyday...

Commit to take a walk every day - even if it's just for 10 minutes. Choose the stairs instead of the elevator. Park farther away and walk. Have fun with your kids - dance in the living room or kick a ball in the yard. Simply put - move more!



Enjoy More Fruits and Veggies...

Eat 2-3 servings of fruit per day, and 3-5 servings of vegetables a day. To maximize the health benefits, choose fruits and vegetables in a variety of colors. Depending on the color, they offer a wide variety of nutrients that your body needs to be healthy.

Prepare More Meals at Home...

Plan meals for your family for a week, two weeks, or longer - whatever works for you. Make a list of all of the food you will need, and then stick to your healthy plan. Keep it simple! Eat together as a family, without the TV, and talk to each other as you eat. Eating at home equals eating healthy!

Re-Think your Drink... Limit juice and soft drinks. Encourage your family to drink water, at least 6-8 eight-ounce glasses each day. Children 1-2 years old need 2 cups of whole milk a day. Older children and adults should drink fat-free or low-fat milk.

Help Prevent SIDS

Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) is an occurrence of sudden, unexpected death in seemingly healthy infants under the age of one year. In the year 2000, SIDS was the 3rd leading cause of infant death in North Carolina.

Here are some tips to help prevent SIDS:

Put your baby to sleep on his back – always! All caregivers of the child should follow this practice.

Provide plenty of supervised "tummy time" where your baby can practice head control while playing and interacting with you!

Use a firm mattress in your baby's crib, and remove all pillows, soft toys, and excess bedding. Never let your baby sleep on a waterbed or a beanbag.

Do not allow anyone to smoke around your baby. Secondhand smoke or smoking during pregnancy can increase the risk of SIDS.

Keep room temperatures comfortable, but not too warm (68-72° F, not over 75° F.) During colder weather, choose a one-piece sleeper for baby, rather than heavier or additional bedding.

What is the Period of PURPLE Crying?

The Period of PURPLE Crying is a program to help parents understand the early weeks and months of an infant's life when they seem to cry frequently, sometimes for hours at a time. Even though it may seem that the baby is in pain, this is a period of normal development that most infants go through. The website www.purplecrying.info has a wealth of information, including educational videos, about this developmental period, along with lots of tips on how to soothe your baby, encourage good sleep habits, and manage the stress this experience can place on your family. Visit the website if you are experiencing a "fussy" baby, but also be sure to consult your pediatrician, your PAT Educator, Early HeadStart Educator, or other early childhood professional for more information and reassurance.

Mandatory Reporting Laws

If you suspect that a child is being abused or neglected, or if you think a child may have died from being mistreated, **you must report what you know** to the county Department of Social Services (695-5600). This is the law (N.C.G.S. §7B-301). Do not be afraid to report. As long as you are acting in good faith, you cannot be held liable. (N.C.G.S. §7B-309).

Red Flags of Autism Spectrum Disorders

The following red flags may indicate a child is at risk for an autism spectrum disorder, and is in need of an immediate evaluation. In clinical terms, there are a few “absolute indicators,” often referred to as “red flags,” that indicate that a child should be evaluated. For a parent, these are the “red flags” that your child should be screened to ensure that he/she is on the right developmental path.

If your baby shows two or more of these signs, please ask your pediatric healthcare provider for an immediate evaluation.

Impairment in Social Interaction:

- Lack of appropriate eye gaze
- Lack of warm, joyful expressions
- Lack of sharing interest or enjoyment
- Lack of response to name

Impairment in Communication:

- Lack of showing gestures
- Lack of coordination of nonverbal communication
- Unusual prosody (little variation in pitch, odd intonation, irregular rhythm, unusual voice quality)

Repetitive Behaviors & Restricted Interests:

- Repetitive movements with objects
- Repetitive movements or posturing of body, arms, hands, or fingers

When Do Children Need Immunizations?

The table lists the current recommended schedule for routine immunizations of infants and children, including a brief description of how each vaccine protects your child. Because this schedule may change, please contact Catawba County Public Health at 828-695-5800 with any questions or for an annual update.

North Carolina law requires every child to have a basic series of immunizations. In order for child care centers and schools to maintain compliance with the immunization laws, it is necessary to have a copy of an updated immunization record or immunization card endorsed by a registered nurse, physician, physician extender, or clinic within 30 days of enrollment on file at the child care center or school. If a child is exempt from vaccination because of medical condition or religious objection, this should be noted on the immunization certificate and supported in the child's file with documentation from the physician or religious authority.

Each child will be provided an immunization card at birth. This card should be treated with care and should accompany the child to each doctor's visit. Please keep this UPDATED immunization card with other important documents such as social security cards and birth certificates.

How Do I Choose Quality Child Care?

There are many child care options available to parents today. In Catawba County, the main types of care available for young children are

How do parents identify a child care program that will be safe, healthy, and will be a good fit for what their family needs?

ChildCareAware suggests visiting several different child care programs before deciding which one is best for your needs. Count the number of adults and the number of children they will each be supervising to make certain there is enough adult supervision to ensure safety, and ask about the training and experience of all adults who will interact with your child. How many of the staff have had CPR/First Aid training? Have all caregivers gone through a background check? Are children supervised at all times, even while sleeping? - Do the caregivers meet with parents regularly and share information about the child on a daily basis?
- Are parents' ideas and input encouraged? Could you be involved?

Activities

- Are the children engaged in interesting and age-appropriate activities?
- Are there plenty of materials in good repair for the children to play with?
- Do the children play outdoors each day? Is the outdoor play area safe and age-appropriate?
- Is there a clear schedule for meals, naps, play in small groups, story time, and individual/quiet time?
- Do the caregivers follow the schedule?
- Are snacks and meals nutritious and appealing?
- Are parents welcome to visit and spend time in the facility?

Looks at an object or person
Shows positive response to familiar sounds

Makes small, throaty noises
Coos expressively, vocalizes
Smiles at mother's voice
Responds vocally to a friendly person

Gross Motor

Waves hands and kicks feet when on back
Turns head to either side when lying on stomach or back

North Carolina Child Passenger Safety Law

Effective January 1, 2005

A properly used child safety seat is required if the child is less than 8 years old AND weighs less than 80 pounds. Most parents and other caregivers will be able to comply using belt-positioning booster seats for children between 40 and 80 pounds. The child must be within the weight range for the child restraint/booster seat, and the seat must meet Federal Standards in effect at time of manufacture.

Children may be secured in a properly fitted seat belt at age 8 (regardless of weight) OR at 80 pounds (regardless of age), whichever comes first. Placing the shoulder belt under a child's (or adult's) arm or behind the back is both dangerous and illegal.

Early Literacy Begins with YOU!

Learn how to help your child get **ready to read** with these simple every day activities ...

Talking ... Children learn about language by listening to parents talk and joining in the conversation. Make a point to include them in conversations while you're in the car and at the dinner table.

Singing ... Songs are a natural way to learn about language. Singing develops listening and memory skills and makes repetition easier for young children. Singing also helps children understand rhyming.

Reading ... The best thing you can do is read with your child! Children who enjoy being read to are more likely to want to learn to read themselves.

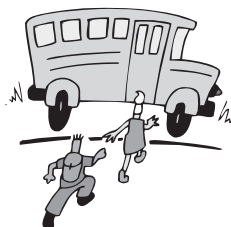
Writing ... Reading and writing go together. Scribbling and drawing are forms of writing. They may not be words, but the lines and pictures your child draws mean something to them. Encourage them to practice those skills.

Playing ... Children learn about language through different kinds of play. Play helps children express themselves, put their thoughts into words, and develop creativity.



I'm Going To Kindergarten!

The Catawba County Partnership for Children is charged with ensuring that children are entering school healthy & prepared for success. Thanks to funding from Smart Start and NC Pre-K, we have developed and funded many projects to support children and families up until they enter kindergarten.



In order to help ensure a smooth transition into "big school," we have produced a booklet called, **"I'm Going To Kindergarten!"** In this booklet, given out to all children before they enter Kindergarten, you will find a lot of important information about how you can prepare your child - and your family - for this adjustment. Here is a sample of some of the information you'll find in the booklet.

Who is eligible for kindergarten?

By NC state law, registration in kindergarten is open to ALL children who turn 5 years old on or before August 31st.

What do I need to bring when I register my child for kindergarten?

- Your child's Social Security card
- Proof of residency (property deed, rental lease, utility bill, etc.)
- Your child's certified birth certificate with seal
- Your child's up-to-date immunization records (see **Page 19** for details)

You will also need to turn in a completed health assessment for your child (completed by your physician or the health department) on the first day of school. Your school will provide the necessary form.

Attention Parents:

You are the first and best teacher for your child.
Being involved in your child's education will make a difference!

How can you help to create a great beginning to your child's kindergarten year?

By simply believing that your child can succeed, you are helping your child to be successful! Expect and encourage a positive attitude about going to school, and your child will follow your lead. Here are some other things you can do to help your child in this important transition to Kindergarten.

- Read with your child every day! Ask questions and answer your child's questions as you read.
- Talk to your child! Listen carefully to your child's experiences, ideas, and feelings. Share stories about some of the good times you had at school when you were a child.
- Help your child learn how to make friends, share, and get along with others by organizing time for him or her to play with other children.
- Work with your child to be independent by learning to snap, zip, button, and tie so that he or she can put on shoes and coats at school.
- Start giving your child some responsibility for small jobs around the house, such as setting the table, or putting away toys and clean clothes.
- Help your child start to make decisions by giving him or her an opportunity to choose which book to read, which shirt to wear, or what activity to do next.
- Complete all of the necessary paperwork that your school requires and don't forget to call the school to get information about any events you should attend such as Beginner's Day, the kindergarten screening days, or parent orientation meetings
- Visit the school with your child. Meet the principal and other staff members and schedule a time to eat lunch in the school cafeteria with your child.
- Establish a good morning and bedtime routine well before the first day of school. Be sure to start with a good breakfast and end with consistent bedtime habits.
